

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Twelfth Sunday of Pentecost Season The Canaanite Woman's Faith July 31, 2016



From the Letter of Saint Paul to the Ephesians 3:1-13

Brothers and Sisters,

Because of this, I, Paul, a prisoner of Christ Jesus for you Gentiles-- if, as I suppose, you have heard of the stewardship of God's grace that was given to me for your benefit, namely, that the mystery was made known to me by revelation, as I have written briefly earlier.

When you read this you can understand my insight into the mystery of Christ, which was not made known to human beings in other generations as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit, that the Gentiles are coheirs, members of the same body, and copartners in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel.

Of this I became a minister by the gift of God's grace that was granted me in accord with the exercise of his power. To me, the very least of all the holy ones, this grace was given, to preach to the Gentiles the inscrutable riches of Christ, and to bring to light (for all) what is the plan of the mystery hidden from ages past in God who created all things, so that the manifold wisdom of God might now be made known through the church to the principalities and authorities in the heavens.

This was according to the eternal purpose that he accomplished in Christ Jesus our Lord, in whom we have boldness of speech and confidence of access through faith in him. So I ask you not to lose heart over my afflictions for you; this is your glory.

From the Holy Gospel according to Saint Matthew 15:21-28

Then Jesus said to her in reply,

"O woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish."

And her daughter was healed from that hour.

Saint Ignatius Loyola - July 31

Soldier -Saint -Founder of the Jesuits

A Noble Basque

Inigo de Loyola was born in Azpeitia (1491) in northern Spain. He was the youngest of 13 children.

Soldier wounded in Battle

He became an officer in the Spanish army. On May 30, at the battle of Pamplona, his leg was broken by a cannon ball and he was bedridden for the next year.



Conversion

During his difficult recovery, Inigo asked for books about chivalry, his favorite reading. There weren't any at the family castle where he convalesced, so he had to settle for a book about the life of Christ and biographies of the saints. The soldier had always dreamed of imitating heroes, but now, the heroes had names like Francis of Assisi and Catherine of Siena. Ignatius noticed that God was working within him — prompting, guiding, inviting.

A Soldier No More

In March of 1522, Ignatius was well enough to leave home with a newfound zeal to serve God. He came to the shrine of Our Lady of Montserrat and kept a vigil all night. He left his sword at the altar and gave his fine clothes to a poor man. He cast aside his life as a noble soldier and dressed himself in rough clothes and sandals so as to take up the life of a poor pilgrim.

Back to School

Ignatius felt a calling to the priesthood but did not have the educational requirements. To answer his vocation he had to go back to school, where he studied Latin grammar alongside children. Ignatius continued his education at the University of Paris.

A New Religious Order

Ignatius and six others (including Saint Francis Xavier) pronounce vows of poverty, chastity and obedience and form the Society of Jesus. On September 27, 1540, Pope Paul III made the Society of Jesus an official religious order in the Catholic Church.

Set the World on Fire

Ignatius centered his spiritual life on the essential foundations of Christianity—the Trinity, Christ, the Eucharist. His spirituality is expressed in the Jesuit motto, ad majorem Dei gloriam—"for the greater glory of God." All activity was to be guided by a true love of the Church and unconditional obedience to the Holy Father, for which reason all professed members took a fourth vow to go wherever the pope should send them for the salvation of souls.

"Receive, Lord, all my liberty, my memory, my understanding and my whole will. You have given me all that I have, all that I am, and I surrender all to your divine will, that you dispose of me. Give me only your love and your grace. With this I am rich enough, and I have no more to ask." (Saint Ignatius)
