



Pentecost Sunday May 15, 2016



The Acts of the Apostles 2:1-21

Brothers and Sisters,

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly there came from the sky a noise like a strong driving wind, and it filled the entire house in which they were. Then there appeared to them tongues as of fire, which parted and came to rest on each one of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in different tongues, as the Spirit enabled them to proclaim.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven staying in Jerusalem. At this sound, they gathered in a large crowd, but they were confused because each one heard them speaking in his own language. 7They were astounded, and in amazement they asked, "Are not all these people who are speaking Galileans? Then how does each of us hear them in his own native language? They were all astounded and bewildered, and said to one another, "What does this mean?" But others said, scoffing, "They have had too much new wine."

Then Peter stood up with the Eleven, raised his voice, and proclaimed to them, "You who are Jews, indeed all of you staying in Jerusalem. Let this be known to you, and listen to my words. These people are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. 16No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

'It will come to pass in the last days, God says, that I will pour out a portion of my spirit upon all flesh. Your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, your young men shall see visions, your old men shall dream dreams. Indeed, upon my servants and my handmaids I will pour out a portion of my spirit in those days, and they shall prophesy. And it shall be that everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

The coming of the Spirit

TODAY WE CELEBRATE what is often called the birthday of the Church. Happy birthday to all!

The apostles were all gathered in one room at the time of the Jewish feast of Pentecost, which falls 50 days after the Passover (or Easter in our Christian calendar).

What follows is a scene filled with scriptural symbols. First, there is the sound of a mighty wind from heaven filling the whole house. The word in Greek for 'spirit' and 'wind' is the same, so the wind clearly indicates the Spirit of God.

Then there appeared tongues of fire which rested on the head of each one present. Again we have a symbol of God's presence. We remember Moses speaking to God out of the bush which was on fire. We remember that, as the Israelites wandered through the desert, they were accompanied during the night by a pillar of fire – God was with them. All present are then filled with the Spirit. The sign of this presence is their ability to speak in different languages.

Immediately, the apostles go out and begin to speak to the crowds of people. Jerusalem was filled with Jewish and convert visitors from all over the Mediterranean, from Asia Minor, Egypt and North Africa, even Rome, to celebrate the feast. These people are amazed to hear unlettered people, speaking to them in so many languages.

The meaning is clear. What the apostles are preaching is a message destined for the whole world and not just for one people. A long time ago, as described in the book of Genesis, men tried to build a tower right up to heaven (Babel). For such arrogance they were punished and humanity became deeply divided. Today, Babel is reversed. All are speaking and hearing the message with full understanding; people are being brought together in unity under God. This is ultimately the mission of the Church, to bring people to God.

On this feast of Pentecost, as we celebrate the formation and the mission of the whole Christian community, we need to reflect on working together in different ways towards a common aim. we also need to reflect on the particular role that God has for me, to reflect on the particular contribution that I can make to the corporate mission of the Church and of the particular group with which I am involved.

What Symbols Does the Bible Use to Describe the Holy Spirit?

One of the difficulties of studying the Holy Spirit is the problem of building a concrete, physical picture of Him. Of course, we're trying to do the impossible. In a very real sense, the spiritual cannot be pictured. However, the Spirit, His purposes, and work can be compared to other things more understandable to us, and this is what God has done through the writers of Scripture. In looking at these symbols, is important to remember that they are limited to illustrating only a small picture of the Holy Spirit.

The Bible uses a number of symbols to describe the person and work of the Holy Spirit. These symbols show the nature, character and work of the Holy Spirit. They include:

- **1. Water:** The Holy Spirit is symbolized by water. This speaks of refreshing, cleansing and washing the believer of his sins.
- **2. Wind or Breath:** The wind symbolizes the invisible yet powerful work of the Holy Spirit.
- **3. Fire:** The presence of God is frequently associated in Scripture with fire. Fire speaks of the holiness of God and the judging of sin in the life of the believer.
- **4. Oil:** Oil was involved in the anointing of the prophets, priests and kings for ministry to their offices. And it was important as a food, and was used as a medication. Oil symbolizes the soothing and healing presence of the Holy Spirit.
- **5. Dove:** Dove represents gentleness and peace which the Holy Spirit provides the believer.
- 6. Still Small Voice: The Spirit is the voice of God that speaks to our innermost being.
- **7. Firstfruits:** The firstfruits were a symbol of the coming harvest. The initial work of the Holy Spirit symbolizes the final salvation and glorification of each believer.
- **8. Cloud:** Cloud is used as a symbol of the Holy Spirit because clouds provide life-giving water.
- 9. Clothing: Clothing speaks of the divine Enduement of the believer with the Holy Spirit.
- **10. Number Seven:** Seven speaks of completion. When used of the Holy Spirit it symbolizes the Spirits fullness and perfection.

These different symbols that the Bible uses to describe the person and work of the Holy Spirit will begin to give us an idea of how He works in our life.

Prayer to the Holy Spirt

Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit and they shall be created. And you shall renew the face of the earth.

O Holy Spirit, divine Spirit of light and love, I consecrate to you my understanding, my heart and my will, my whole being for time and for eternity. Amen.

So let us always be ready for tomorrow by continuing to live today with HIM. Keep the Lord on your side as He wants to guide you through life each and every day. And the most important thing to leave this reading with is that while we think we are in charge, we are not. God, our Father is in charge! So instead of jumping on Facebook or Twitter today, spend a few extra minutes in prayer and discussion with God, our Father and I promise you that you will get comfort and enjoyment out of each day as time goes on.
