From the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans 1:1-11

Brothers and Sisters,

Now there is no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. For the law of the spirit of life in Christ Jesus has freed you from the law of sin and death.

For what the law, weakened by the flesh, was powerless to do, this God has done:

by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh and for the sake of sin,

he condemned sin in the flesh,

so that the righteous decree of the law might be fulfilled in us,

who live not according to the flesh but according to the spirit.

For those who live according to the flesh are concerned with the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the spirit with the things of the spirit.

The concern of the flesh is death, but the concern of the spirit is life and peace.

For the concern of the flesh is hostility toward God;

it does not submit to the law of God, nor can it;

and those who are in the flesh cannot please God.

But you are not in the flesh;

on the contrary, you are in the spirit, if only the Spirit of God dwells in you.

Whoever does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him.

But if Christ is in you, although the body is dead because of sin,

the spirit is alive because of righteousness.

If the Spirit of the one who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you,

the one who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also, through his Spirit that dwells in you.

But the Pharisees went out and took counsel against him to put him to death. When Jesus realized this, he withdrew from that place. Many (people) followed him, and he cured them all, but he warned them not to make him known.

This was to fulfill what had been spoken through Isaiah the prophet: "Behold, my servant whom I have chosen, my beloved in whom I delight; I shall place my spirit upon him, and he will proclaim justice to the Gentiles. He will not contend or cry out, nor will anyone hear his voice in the streets. A bruised reed he will not break, a smoldering wick he will not quench, until he brings justice to victory.

And in his name the Gentiles will hope."

BEHOLD MY SERVANT WHOM I HAVE CHOSEN

In everyone's life there are key moments or turning points on which the whole of one's life hinges.

The mounting confrontation between the Pharisees and Jesus was such a decisive event and crisis.

The religious leaders became intolerant because of their prejudice. Nothing that Jesus would do or say from this point on would be right in their eyes. They conspired, not simply to oppose Jesus but to eliminate him.



Jesus met this defiance with courage and determination.

He used the crisis to teach his disciples an important lesson for the kingdom way to success and victory. The only way to glory in God's kingdom is through the cross.

Jesus quoted from the "Suffering Servant" prophecies of Isaiah to explain how he would accomplish his mission, not through crushing power but through sacrificial service.

In place of a throne he would mount the cross and wear a crown of thorns. There is no greater proof of God's love for us. Jesus died not only for Jew but Gentile as well.

Isaiah had prophesied centuries before, that the Messiah would bring justice to the Gentiles. To the Greek mind, justice involved giving to God and to men that which is their due.

Jesus taught his disciples how to behave towards God and towards others. Jesus brings justice tempered with divine love. He does not bruise the weak or treat them with contempt, but rather shows understanding.

He does not discourage the fainthearted but gives encouragement and hope. No matter how hopeless or weak one may be, the Lord Jesus is ever ready to bring his healing love, hope, and encouragement. Do you hope in God and trust in his mercy and justice?

"Lord, strengthen me in your love and hope. Make me an instrument of your hope that I may encourage those who have no hope."

Suicide Bombings targeted the Lebanese Christian town of Al-Qaa

A wave of suicide bombings targeted the Lebanese Christian town of al-Qaa, which borders Syria, on Monday June 27. In the early hours, four suicide bombers detonated their explosive belts, followed in the late evening by four other suicide bombings. The attacks are an indicator of attempts by Syrian terror organizations such as Jabhat al-Nusra and the Islamic State (IS) to break the siege imposed on them by Lebanese intelligence and army.





The entire community bid farewell to five of its members died during 27 June attacks. In his homily the Greek-Melkite Archbishop stressed: "We will remain in this land, knowing that the aim of the bombers is to eradicate Christian presence." He asked government to solve the emergency situation in the refugee camp on the outskirts of the town.

Faysal Aad, Joseph Lebbos, Majed Wehbe, Boulos al-Ahmar and George Fares were laid to rest at the town's cemetery after a highly emotional funeral that was held amid strict security measures.

The funeral had been postponed to Wednesday over security fears, after the town was hit by two waves of attacks on Monday.

Four suicide bombers targeted the town in the pre-dawn attack, killing five people and wounding 15 others, as another four bombers attacked the town in the evening and wounded 13 people. One of the suicide bombers blew himself up in front of the Greek-Melkite church.

According to the faithful the aim of the bombers is to clear al-Qaa from the Christian presence. Dany Awad, vice-president of the municipality, warns: "We are not afraid of anyone. We will stay here, to defend our village, to the end. We are rooted in this sacred land."

Lebanon hosts more than 1.1 million Syrians, a huge burden for the country of four million people. Several Lebanese politicians have warned about the inability of the country to bear this burden and had already called for the closure of borders after security incidents.
